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Introduction

The Harriet Tubman Institute for Research on the Global Migrations of African Peoples welcomes you to “Slavery, Memory, Citizenship”, Summer Institute/Institut d’Été 2011.

The Teaching and Research Programme of the Fourth Institut Interdisciplinaire Virtuel des Hautes Études sur les Esclavages et les Traites (IVHEET) Summer Institute 2011, “Slavery, Memory, Citizenship” will focus on the connections between slavery (both historic and contemporary forms), the ways in which the institution is remembered (that is, researched, taught and publicly presented) and its implications for claims for complete citizenship.

The Institute aims to explore the interplay between history and memory and its manifestations in contemporary society. The programme will therefore include an examination of the various ways in which this particular past of forced migration and slavery is recalled and used to determine present day social policy and action. Participants will engage in the following areas of study:

- Demography, Ethnicity and Identity
- African Canadian Experiences
- Biography and Diaspora Linkages
- Memory and Cultural Expression
- Citizenship and Contemporary Issues

“Slavery, Memory, Citizenship”, the Summer Institute 2011 follows on the previous Institutes at Aix-en-Provence (August 2008), Ouagadougou (October 2009) and Port-au-Prince (December 2009). It is significant that it will be held during the year that the United Nations has designated as the “International Year for People of African Descent.”

Language Policy

The working language of the Institute is English. Written communications are accepted in English, French, Spanish and Portuguese, although organizers will respond in English unless otherwise required.

The cost of simultaneous interpretation and written translations is prohibitive; but conference organizers had made every reasonable effort to accommodate participants who are not fluent in written or oral English.

Plenary sessions will be conducted in both English and French, with simultaneous translation in these languages.

The workshops will be conducted primarily in English, although presentations at the junior scholar workshop may be made in French.

During some workshops, language monitors will be available to assist participants with translation problems.

The virtual seminars will be conducted in French only.

The evening programmes and the closing luncheon will be conducted in English only, with the assistance of language monitors.

The tour on Saturday will be conducted in English with the assistance of a French language monitor.

Sexual Harassment Policy

Definition

York University strives to provide an environment wherein all students, faculty and staff are able to learn, study, teach and work, free from sexual harassment, including harassment on the basis of gender identification and sexual orientation.

Sexual harassment is:

1. Unwanted sexual attention of a persistent or abusive nature, made by a person who knows or ought reasonably to know that such attention is unwanted;

3. The making of an implied or express threat of reprisal, in the form of actual reprisal or the denial of opportunity, for refusal to comply with a sexually oriented request;
4. Sexually oriented remarks and behaviour which may reasonably be perceived to create a negative psychological and emotional environment for work and study.

Incidents of sexual harassment, including harassment on the basis of gender identification and sexual orientation shall be investigated and dealt with by the University in accordance with guidelines and procedures put in place for that purpose from time to time.

Students, faculty and staff who, it is determined, have sexually harassed another member(s) of the University community will be subject to discipline and sanctions as are appropriate in the circumstances, including but not limited to discipline and sanctions provided for in Presidential Regulations (in the case of students), and relevant collective agreements.

The UNESCO Slave Route Project (Division of Cultural Policies and Intercultural Dialogue) has recognized that historic sites associated with people of African descent constitute an “Itinerary of Memory.” As a UNESCO Slave Route Project, Itineraries of African Canadian Memory includes an initial eleven sites of historic memory, with the intention of undertaking a programme of research and further designation across the country. The Itineraries of African Canadian Memory highlights the importance of the African Canadian past within the framework of the UNESCO Slave Route Project and is launched during the UN-designated International Year for People of African Descent. The Right Honourable Michaëlle Jean, former Governor General of Canada and current UNESCO Special Envoy for Haiti, is presiding at the dedication on August 23, 2011, the day proclaimed by the UNESCO as an International Day for the Remembrance of the Slave Trade and its Abolition. 

The Harriet Tubman Institute for Research on the Global Migrations of African Peoples is a multi-disciplinary research centre dedicated to the study of voluntary and forced migrations of African peoples throughout the world and the subsequent impact in the contemporary world.

The vision of The Tubman Institute is to promote a greater understanding of the history of slavery and its legacy - especially the importance of the African past in the history of Canada, the Americas and the Atlantic world. The Tubman Institute addresses the social and economic injustices that have resulted from slavery, the slave trade and the racialized consequences, including the difficulty of confronting contemporary forms of slavery.

The Institute is named in honour of Harriet Tubman (ca. 1822-1913), African-American abolitionist, humanitarian and feminist whose role in helping people escape to Canada on the Underground Railroad is legendary and whose fearless advocacy of freedom and equity serves as a continuing model in the quest for social justice.

Fellows of The Tubman Institute are actively engaged in teaching at the undergraduate and graduate levels and in supervision of graduate students, for whom the Institute provides research and academic support. Members of the Institute undertake research in three programme areas:

- * Slavery in Africa, the trans-Atlantic slave trade and the African diaspora
- * African Canadian experiences
- * Contemporary forms of slavery

The Harriet Tubman Resource Center supports the research needs of African diaspora scholars and promotes a greater understanding of the history of slavery and its legacy by collecting and making accessible primary and secondary materials related to the forced and voluntary migrations of African peoples around the world.

The Harriet Tubman Institute is associated with the UNESCO Slave Route Project and is part of a national and international network of universities, research centers, public institutions, community-based museums, scholars, public historians and researchers who are actively engaged in research and dissemination of knowledge on the global migrations of African peoples and the cultural and demographic consequences of those migrations.
