AP/HIST 1086 6.0 *Two sections*	SU	Vice, Deviance, Bad Behaviour, and Social Control in North America since 1600	<b>*ONLINE*</b>		Explores how, in North America since 1600, certain behaviours have been defined by social actors and state agencies as bad behaviour or vices, and how these behaviours have been regulated. Introduces students to the role that issues such as drug and alcohol use, abortion, prostitution, and sexuality (to name a few) have played in the development of moral and social regulation and how they have changed over time.
AP/HIST 3130 6.0	SU	The Roman Revolution	TR	16:00-19:00	The Roman Revolution. An examination of the political, cultural, economic and social transformation of the Roman state and society during the late Roman republic and early empire.
AP/HIST 3390 6.0	SU	Europe Since 1870	<b>*ONLINE*</b>		An examination of political, economic and social developments in the leading states; the balance of power and World War I; democracy and totalitarianism between the wars; World War II and its aftermath.
AP/HIST 3400 6.0	SU	Tudor and Stuart England: 1485 to 1714	<b>*ONLINE*</b>		Examines the recovery and development of English society after the late medieval crisis. Topics include: aristocracy and peasantry; crime and the law; women; religion; the Tudor state; the Civil War.
AP/HIST 3581 6.0	SU	Immigrant Experience in Canada	MW	14:30-17:30	This course examines government policy, public attitudes and the immigrant life in Canada before and after the Second World War, as well as the refugee question and multiculturalism.
AP/HIST 3645 3.0	S2	Post-World War II U.S. Political Movements	<b>*ONLINE*</b>		This course analyzes major political movements that have transformed the United States. The course focuses on African American, women's, and lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender movements.
AP/HIST 3691 3.0	S1	America's Cold War	TR	14:30-17:30	This course analyzes the Cold War as a clash of ideologies and "empires" and explores its impact on US foreign policy and on the political, economic, social, and cultural life of the United States.
AP/HIST 3775 3.0	S2	History of Hong Kong	MW	11:30-14:30	The economic, political, social and cultural development of the city state of Hong Kong and its environs, within the context of Chinese and British imperial history, from its 19th-century foundations to the present.
AP/HIST 3874 3.0	S1	History of Food in the Americas, 1500-2000	MW	11:30-14:30	Examines the history of the production, distribution, preparation and consumption of foods such as pizza, donuts, pineapples, tacos, coffee and graham crackers as a way to understand historical patterns such as the European conquest of the Americas, African slavery, nineteenth- and twentieth-century Asian and European migrations, the growth of cities, the development of nation-states, and shifting gender roles.
AP/HIST 4082 6.0	SU	Re-Framing the Past: Films as History	MW	19:00-22:00	How do film-makers handle the past? How does their treatment differ from that of the historian, whether by presentation, inspiration or interpretation? This course explores these issues within the time-frame of the democratic revolutions of the 18th century.
AP/HIST 4520 6.0	SU	Metis History in North America: From the Ethnogenesis of a New People in the 17th-Century Fur Trade to their Fight for Rights in the 21st Century	TR	11:30-14:30	This course studies the history of Metis in North America from the meeting of Indigenous women and European fur traders in 1630 to court cases of Metis rights in the 21st century. It examines the emergence of distinct ethnic groups that blended European and indigenous traditions, and the transformation of Metis into a political collectivity recognized in the Canadian constitution.
