Brown's A Biography of No Place: From Ethnic Borderland to Soviet Heartland (Harvard 2004) was awarded the American Historical Association's George Louis Beer Prize for the Best Book in International European History. Brown's most recent book Dispatches from Dystopia: History of Places Not Yet Forgotten was published in 2015. She will publish A Manual for Survival: A Chernobyl Guide to the Future with Norton in 2019.
