COURSE	TERM	COURSE TITLE	FORMAT	DAY	TIME	BRIEF DESCRIPTION
AP/HIST 1086 6.0	SU	Vice, Deviance, Bad Behaviour, and Social Control in North America since 1600	ONLINE			Explores how, in North America since 1600, certain behaviours have been defined by social actors and state agencies as bad behaviour or vices, and how these behaviours have been regulated. Introduces students to the role that issues such as drug and alcohol use, abortion, prostitution, and sexuality (to name a few) have played in the development of moral and social regulation and how they have changed over time.
AP/HIST 2400 6.0	SU	British History from the Tudors to Thatcher, 1500-2000	LECT	MW	11:30-14:30	An introductory history of modern Britain from the Tudors to Margaret Thatcher. Topics cover the main features of British development from the Reformation and Civil War to the Industrial Revolution, Empire and two World Wars.
AP/HIST 2710 6.0	SU	History of East Asia	LECT	TR	11:30-14:30	Explores how distinctive patterns of government, society and culture emerged over four millennia in East Asia - primarily China and Japan - and how this endogenous development prepared those nations to confront and challenge Western supremacy in the modern world.
AP/HIST 3160 6.0	SU	Women and Gender in Ancient Greece and Rome	ONLINE			The course explores the social, economic, political and cultural history of women in ancient Greece and Rome. It examines Greek and Roman concepts of gender and sexuality, and considers the literary and artistic representation of women in these cultures.
AP/HIST 3365 3.0	M	European Fascism: 1890-1945	LECT	MW	14:30-17:30	This course examines the varieties of European fascism that emerge after 1890, the intellectual and cultural origins of fascist ideology and the nature of fascist movements and regimes in inter-war Europe.
AP/HIST 3390 6.0	SU	Europe Since 1870	ONLINE			An examination of political, economic and social developments in the leading states; the balance of power and World War I; democracy and totalitarianism between the wars; World War II and its aftermath.
AP/HIST 3400 6.0	SU	Tudor and Stuart England: 1485 to 1714	ONLINE			Examines the recovery and development of English society after the late medieval crisis. Topics include: aristocracy and peasantry; crime and the law; women; religion; the Tudor state; the Civil War.
AP/HIST 3691 3.0	S1	America's Cold War	LECT	TR	14:30-17:30	This course analyzes the Cold War as a clash of ideologies and "empires" and explores its impact on US foreign policy and on the political, economic, social, and cultural life of the United States.
AP/HIST 3860 6.0	SU	Modern History of the Jews	ONLINE			A survey of Jewish history from the breakdown of traditional society in the 18th century until the present. The focus will be on the Jews of Europe and the major offshoots of Jewish Europe, Israel and North America.
AP/HIST 4082 6.0	SU	Re-Framing the Past: Films as History	LECT	MW	19:00-22:00	How do film-makers handle the past? How does their treatment differ from that of the historian, whether by presentation, inspiration or interpretation? This course explores these issues within the time-frame of the democratic revolutions of the 18th century.
AP/HIST 4508 6.0	SU	Cultures and Colonialism: Canada, 1600-1900	SEM N	TR	14:30-17:30	Explores issues of contact and colonialism in Canadian history from 1600 - 1900. Themes may include the shifting practices of European imperialism; new cultural forms created by First Nations-European contact; changing economic systems; and patterns of state formation.

AP/HIST 2100 6.0A* *This is a 0.5 CD position-one term only. The term (F or W) will be determined at a later date.*	Y	Ancient Greece and Rome	LECT & TUTR	MW	10:30-11:30	A study of the Greek and Roman world, with particular emphasis on its social, economic and intellectual history, using primary sources archaeological, epigraphic and literary wherever possible.
AP/HIST 2150 6.0	Y	Classical Greek and Roman Archaeology: An Introduction	LECT	M	14:30-17:30	The course provides an introduction to the history, theory and methodology of Classical Greek and Roman Archaeology. It examines key archaeological excavations in the Graeco-Roman world to explore the history of Greek and Roman archaeology, circa 1700 to the present. Introducing students to the formation processes of the archaeological record, it also examines modern archaeological methodology, theory and recording techniques.
AP/HIST 3125 3.0	M	Sport and Society in Ancient Greece	LECT & TUTR	R	14:30-16:30	This course studies the place of athletic competition in ancient Greek society, with a particular focus on the Archaic and Classical periods (eighth - fourth centuries BC) and on the panhellenic games, of which the Olympic Games were the most important.
AP/HIST 3771 3.0	F	Modern Chinese History I	LECT	T	11:30-14:30	The process by which modern China emerged from the ruins of the traditional order, tracing the history of China from the early 19th century to the present.
AP/HIST 3773 3.0	W	Opium, Rebellion, and the Woman Question in China 1800-1911	LECT	T	11:30-14:30	This course engages the first seventy years of "China's 100 years of humiliation" (1842-1949). We examine China's often violent encounters with foreign powers beginning with the Opium Wars in the mid-19th century. Our focus is on China's efforts from 1800-1911 to become a modern nation through the reform of politics, society and the status of women, and ultimately through rebellion.
